<p><a href="#">YUCOM</a> was founded in 1997 as an expert, voluntary, non-governmental organization whose members are legal experts engaged in promoting and advocating the idea of the rule of law and the upholding of human rights, raising public awareness, conceiving, designing and leading civic initiatives, rendering legal assistance to victims of human rights violations, as well as developing co-operation with national and international organizations involved in human rights protection and promotion. YUCOM is recognized as an <b>organization advocating human rights</b> and promoting active participation of citizens in legal initiatives. It has profiled itself and gained much recognition as a human rights defenders' organization.</p> <p>Since 2005 YUCOM started filing cases to the European Court for Human Rights and is currently in the procedure before ECtHR with cases that received a confirmation of priority before that Court. YUCOM is coordinating the Coalition for Equality <a href="http://www.korak-hapi-step.eu">www.korak-hapi-step.eu</a>, which advocates for <b>human rights on a regional level (Serbia, Montenegro, Kosovo, Macedonia and Bosnia and Herzegovina)</b> and focuses on the different areas of discrimination, including LGBT rights, strengthening the role of women in politics and public life and monitoring court procedures for discrimination. [Philip Leach](#) is Professor of Human Rights Law at Middlesex University, a solicitor, and was Director of the European Human Rights Advocacy Centre (EHRAC: [ehrac.org.uk](http://ehrac.org.uk)), also based at Middlesex University. He has extensive experience of representing applicants before the European Court of Human Rights, in particular against Russia and other former Soviet states, as well as the UK and Turkey. He researches and publishes widely in the field of international human rights law. He was a member of the Independent Advisory Panel on Deaths in Custody from 2009-2015 and a member of the Harris Review (2014-2015). He was appointed Specialist Adviser to the Joint Committee on Human Rights for its inquiry into mental health and deaths in prison in 2016-2017. He is Vice-Chair of the European Implementation Network EIN, a member of the Advisory Board of the Open Society Justice Initiative, and a former trustee of the Media Legal Defence Initiative and the Human Dignity Trust. He is the author of 'Taking a Case to the European Court of Human Rights', 4<sup>th</sup> ed., Oxford University Press, 2017.

## Dr Ramute Remezaite

[Ramute Remezaite](#) is Implementation Lead at EHRAC and has a PhD from the School of Law, Middlesex University. Her PhD thesis focused on the impact of judgments of the European Court of Human Rights in fragile democracies, such as former Soviet Union states. Prior to this, Ramute was based in Azerbaijan, where she litigated civil rights cases before the European Court of Human Rights and the UN bodies together with local human rights lawyers. She also ran a project on the implementation of judgments of the European Court for Human Rights in the South Caucasus region and has done research and consultancy work for Article 19 and the International Bar Association Human Rights Institute. Ramute has published a number of articles on human rights issues in Azerbaijan. Before that, she worked as a Program Officer at the Bertha Justice Initiative in London, and at the Human Rights House Foundation in Oslo, Norway where she worked with a network of NGOs in former Soviet Union states. Ramute graduated from Oslo University, Law School with LL.M. in Public International Law and Master in Law from Vilnius University.

## Anne-Katrin Speck

[Anne](#) holds an LLM in International Human Rights Law and worked as a Co-Director of EIN for 1.5 years before returning to academia in June 2020. They currently work as a full-time doctoral researcher at Ghent University. The implementation of Strasbourg Court judgments has been a fixture of their professional life ever since they acted as a Co-Secretary to the Committee on Legal Affairs and Human Rights of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe. Between 2015 and 2018, Anne was a Research Associate at Middlesex University London, where they were involved in a large [research project](#) that explored the factors that impact on the implementation of human rights judgments and decisions in Europe, Africa, the Americas and the UN system. Anne has co-authored several peer-reviewed articles and shorter pieces on the implementation of ECtHR judgments. As EIN Co-Director, they contributed to growing the network, overhauling EIN's training methodology, advising NGOs on their advocacy strategies, and compiling and drafting guidance on domestic advocacy aimed at promoting the implementation of ECtHR judgments.

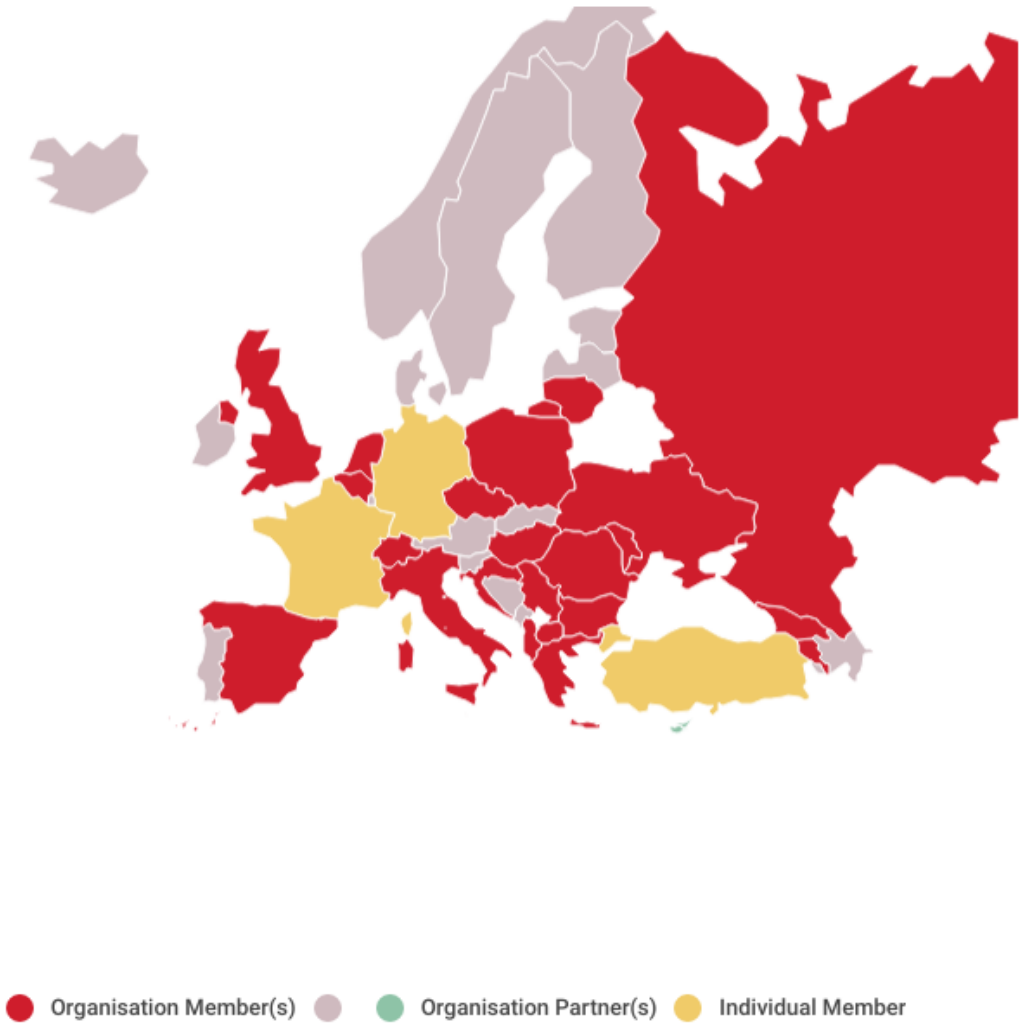
## Nigel Warner (former member)

### Founding member
